Awakening to our Regional Community

Candlemas - A Festival of Light

As we head into February, we find ourselves mid-way between the winter solstice and spring equinox. Throughout the world February 2nd is noted as one of the cross-quarter days. We are certainly familiar with the celebration of Groundhog Day at which point we hope for a peep into what we may expect regarding winters end. It is also a celebration of Candlemas. This is a feast of light and stirring within the womb of earth, a warming and awakening in anticipation of the renewed fertility of nature. It is also identified as a festival for the presentation of Jesus in the temple at whereupon the old Simeon announced this child would be a light for the Gentiles. Beginning in the fifth century, candles were lit and in the 11th century blessed as a way to mark this day. Many Waldorf Schools and their communities celebrate this day by making hand-dipped beeswax



candles with students or planting seeds. Candles are amazing in their capacity to warm and lighten the darkness. Seeds are likewise amazing as all that becomes from a single seed is contained within such a compact and potent mystery. Snowdrops, one of the first early spring flowers to poke their heads toward the light often through a blanket of snow are also known as Candlemas Bells. These sweet white blossoms are believed to purify a home when brought inside after February 2nd. Have you seen any snowdrops yet?

Reports from Around our Region:

Our reports from around the region this month reflect the various ways in which the Holy Nights were held and experienced. I want to thank those who offered these reports and photographs which demonstrate how we are linked in our spiritual striving regardless of distance. It is a remarkable picture to contemplate the depth living among our members as they move through the seasons and the course of the year.

New Orleans, LA

Our tradition of reading for the Holy Nights began in 1999/2000, when, as Rita Amedee's mother was dying, Rita and I took up the John Gospel. Joan Hammond crossed the threshold as we were reading aloud in her room the High Priestly Prayer on the evening of January 2. It was deeply moving and utterly convincing!

Every year since (with the exception of two years post-Katrina), we have met nightly at my house, beginning Christmas night; and have taken up, in rotation, Rudolf Steiner's lecture series on the gospels. Working year after year with this material about the true nature of Jesus, of Christ, the nativity, the Mystery of Golgotha, and the Resurrection has allowed it to enter into our group in a most profound way - something readily sensed even by those who are new to our group and to Steiner.

Every year it is a journey. The commitment to 13 nights from December 25 through January 6 seems at the outset overwhelming, but it is definitely worth the effort! After last year's work with The Fifth Gospel, Darlene Wapegan enthused that, having been given this new understanding, she had "fallen in love with the Christ."

It should be noted that this was our first Holy Nights without Inge Elsas physically in our midst. Though Inge never attended every night, she loved being with us on Christmas and Epiphany. Now that she is in the spiritual world, dear Inge chalked up perfect attendance - even outdoing the hostess, who was in bed with a stomach virus on the first night!

That evening, the Three Kings Festival included a staged pageant of

the Kings' arrival from Mathew 2. We shared a Three Kings cake, blessed the house

Harbor Springs, MI

During the season of Advent, I hand-rolled twelve 'zodiac' beeswax candles, plus one large pillar, for use on my Holy Nights altar (pictured here).

I pair the candles with the corresponding card that represents the New Images of the Zodiac from the original Calendar of the Soul, and this I place around the crèche.

Starting at Solstice, I come before this altar, and lighting first only the large pillar candle, I draw the images, starting first with the image that appeared three times in the original Calendar of the Christ Being being released from the spiritual world and descending into the Earth to then ascend from there (pictured here in pink, behind and left of the guarding angel). This image holds the boundary of the Holy Nights journey, and my plan is to draw it three times throughout the Holv Nights:



- 1. at Solstice (Christ's descent from spiritual world);
- 2. at New Year's Eve midnight (Christ penetrating Earth);
- 3. at Epiphany (Christ ascending all the forces of the zodiac from the physical world).

In between these three activities, I come before the altar each evening, and lighting the pillar as well as the corresponding zodiacal candle, I draw the image that corresponds to that evening. I also review my journal from the year past that corresponded to Sun's moving through that sign of the zodiac, and on the following morning I contemplate that same zodiacal season for the coming year. By the 12th night, all of the candles are burning and, if I have done my work, there is a great deal of solace and comfort streaming forth from the display.

The elements of this contemplation have come together over many years, starting with my work with Tamara Slayton in 1996 and followed by my sister Patricia's repackaging of the New Images for contemplation, and then my work with candle maker Linda Nagel of www.candlesconnectinghearts.com

Each year I have hoped to offer a workshop in making the candles and building the connection between starlight and candlelight, two forms of light that do not diminish the mystery of the darkness, and so this work has taken many forms over the years, including my joining the group in Ann Arbor on the 28 December this year. - Mary Adams
